LEHMAN COLLEGE STUDENTS RISE 'ALL THE WAY UP' AT COMMENCEMENT CEREMONY

Fat Joe and J.E. Franklin to Receive Honorary Degrees

The Bronx, NY—Wielding the power of the pen, Fat Joe's verses have scripted The Bronx's story onto the pages of Hip-Hop history. On May 30, 2024, more than 3,100 graduates of Lehman College will hear from the Hip Hop legend and entrepreneur as they set off to write the next chapter of their lives.

Joining Fat Joe in receiving an honorary degree is American playwright, educator, and activist **J. E. Franklin** best known for her ground-breaking play "Black Girl" (1969). The impact of her work and storytelling come full circle as she returns to the school where she once inspired young minds as a Lehman professor.

"This year's honorary degree recipients serve as living examples of the difference one can make beyond their chosen fields," said Fernando Delgado, Lehman College President. "As our students get ready to embark on their own journeys, let this be a reminder that success is more than personal and professional achievements; it's also the change you create for others and the indelible mark you leave on this world. Congratulations to the class of 2024."

Adding to the celebration, and for the first time in the College's history, the names of all graduating students will be called out as they walk across the stage to receive their diplomas.

Lehman's Class of 2024 is spread across six schools, including the second graduating cohorts of both the School of Business and Doctor of Nursing Practice program. Among the graduates is Yarys Lopez, a political science major whose resilience and determination were key factors in helping her family thrive after fleeing race-based violence in Honduras. She now works with the New York Legal Assistance Group to help families and new immigrants like herself.

Khea Ireland, an international student from Belize, will graduate with a degree in speech pathology and plans to continue her studies in Lehman's graduate speech-language pathology program so she can bring critical services to her community back home, where there are few practitioners. Ireland's two sisters are also Lehman students. The graduate address will be delivered by Alicia Rodriguez-Allie. A political science major who was born in Puerto Rico, she is first-generation college student. She is active in student life and has served as a senator in the Student Government Association. The Commencement ceremony will be available to stream live on the 2024 Commencement page.

Members of the media are invited to capture footage of the entire ceremony, including interviews with event organizers, faculty, and students and family members.

About J. E. Franklin

Jennie Elizabeth Franklin, known as J. E. Franklin, is an American playwright best known for her ground-breaking play "Black Girl" (1969). Franklin penned Black Girl in 1969 as a response to the Moynihan Report, which linked Black poverty to Black matriarchy. Initially commissioned for television, it received critical acclaim and was later staged and directed by Shauneille Perry at the New Federal Theatre. A trailblazer in the

world of theatre, Franklin joined Lehman College as a part-time me lecturer in the Department of Education, moving into a full-time faculty role in 1970. She taught at Lehman until 1975. During this time, she wrote several plays for Lehman students, published notable anthologies, and received numerous awards and fellowships for her contributions to the dramatic arts.
